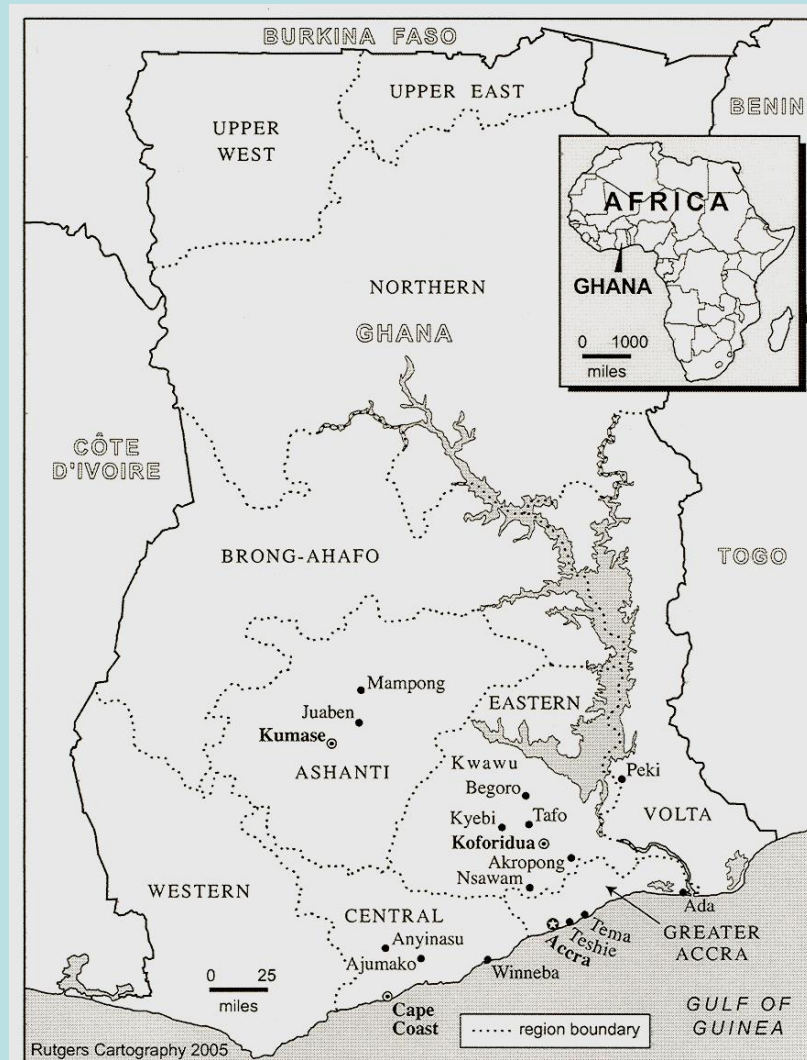

Ghana Demographic and Health Survey (1998)

- 17.9% of urban children and 15.0% of rural children were living with neither their mother nor father.
- This figure increased as children got older, from a low of 2.6% of children below the age of two years to a high of 23.6% of children between the ages of ten and fourteen years.
